Introduction to Applied Video Analysis (AVA)

This presentation looks to a future where the values of Gentle Teaching are alive and well. Applied Video Analysis (AVA) is based on the Circle of Support model (Forest, Snow & Pearpoint, 1994).

Put very simply, AVA is a guided process whereby the person at the centre collaborates with their circle of friends to build a library of video resources evidencing how that person likes to be supported.

It aims to help parents address one of their biggest worries: "What will happen to my child when I am gone?" AVA helps to ensure that agreed ways of supporting are clear for all to see and that a library of Good Enough Videos is available to help introduce new caregivers to agreed ways of supporting the person.

All those in the Circle of Support are expected to complete some basic training and commit to ongoing AVA.

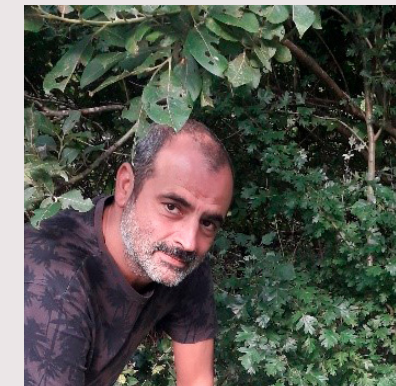
Theme:
